

Forever And Ever And Ever And Ever dives into the stream of youthful abandon and takes a look at the under-explored but culturally distinctive phenomenon of 'tropical summer' in the Philippines through the works of emerging contemporary artists based in the island nation. How has summer as a cultural phenomenon and experience shaped an understanding of Philippine's annual hot and humid season last roughly from May to July, each year?

richly varied. One can think of it in a number of ways - a rite of passage, a languorous idyll, a time of celebration or reflection - occasions and events (both momentous and inconsequential) that we create to escape from the season's oppressive heat.

Long school vacations, beach holidays, weddings, barbecues, christenings, fiestas, teenage romance. summer flings, coming of age experiences. Think of how similar these culturally formative experiences correspond with the ones in the West.

Filipino cultural identity, like all other post-colonial countries, is just as much shaped by its decades long contact with its colonial counterpart. Yet, marrying it to a distinctively local weather, a geographically specific hybrid of a performance in the form of a visual bricolage. sensibility emerges - with its particular taste, smell, colour - to create a culturally enriching experience of perpetual festivity and reminiscing, benign aimlessness. inflated stream of youthful energy at the intersection between growing up and looking back.

Rather than reprising a post-colonial critique, the exhibition sees this hybrid form as a trajectory in exploring its manifested culture. Along the way, we pick up the stories, loose personal strands that when weaved together, create a poetic tapestry of the way we respond and shape our lives through a seasonal frame.

Painter Costantino Zicarelli and photographer MM Yu colour in elements of summer by portraying museumhopping activity and the street scenes respectively. They play against each other in terms of subject, contrasting. cultural life to destitution, markedly highlighting the jarring disparity that is part of Filipino society.

Tatong Recheta Torres, Martha Atlenza and Ferdz Valencia respond to the sense of aimlessness so integral to the languid listlessness of the season. Known locally as 'tambay', it translates as hanging around to pass time. Tatons Recheta Torres shows people in 'tambay'

mode - idle talk over sodas and canoodling in the pool As an imported cultural lens, the experience of summer is - while Martha Atienza's video explores the dimension dressed protagonist who both embraces and challenges the pounding waves. On the other hand, Ferdz Valencia constructs a sculptural installation that pays tribute to skate boarding culture, monumental in its encapsulation of the free-spirited youth.

> Coming of age stories influenced and drawn from personal memory banks are examined by Morio Jeong and John Torres. Maria Jeona extracts a summer far removed from herself in her performative work, indicative of old photographs while personified body parts point to the body in the midst of a holiday, John Torres, on the other hand, collects fragments of narratives from summers spent with books and combines them to a documentary

Meanwhile, Electrolychee duo, Bernie Bru and Marcushiro, explore embroidery and collage respectively, create playfully crafted works that explore visual vocabularies drawn from highly personal and idiosyncratic experiences.

Last but not least, design, so integral to the way younger generations of artist think is what we would also like to acknowledge, Here, Mica Cabildo, Mark Salvatus and Dex Fernandez come together as independent merchandise artists to present product designs that attempt to capture the paradoxical ethos of a fleeting yet endless summer, reflecting on the complexity of the visual codes and colours that fashion remembrance.

Forever and Ever and Ever takes into consideration the temporal and geographical deferments realised within an exhibition narrative of Filipino summer held in the month of November in Singapore. These central to the imagination of summer - so that when we look back, we return to the formative experiences that shape who we are today - allowing us to access the mnemonic power of aesthetics, as a longing for a different place, a place back in time.
